American Innovation and Abundance

The US is entering a new era of decarbonization, adaptation and local, national, and global cooperation on climate. This first of its kind, day-long event will serve as a focal point to elevate and explore the next generation of US leadership in innovation, investment, and resilience.



Energy

Energy sits at the center of the transition; shaping security, competitiveness, and growth. As demand rises from electrification and AI, the challenge is no longer just generating clean power, but delivering it reliably, affordably, at scale and pace. From grid modernization and storage to market design and system flexibility, the focus must shift to building resilient, future-ready energy mix which reduces reliance, manages risk, and powers the economies of today, and tomorrow.



Food

Food security must be treated with the same urgency as energy security, but fragmented approaches risk leaving the system exposed. Climate shocks, shifting crop priorities, and rising import volatility are driving up both the cost and energy footprint of what we eat. From regenerative agriculture and deforestation to protein diversification and food waste, the focus is on scaling solutions that strengthen supply chains, cut emissions, and secure resilient food systems.



Leadership and Green Growth

Driving the transition at pace requires bold leadership, smart strategy, and collaborative action. From demonstrating the business case for climate action and scaling solutions to developing innovative finance models and partnerships, we must mobilise capital, unlock ROI, and create frameworks that accelerate the transition. The aim is to turn climate ambition into growth, competitiveness, and measurable impact, ensuring that leadership, strategy, and collaboration deliver results for both business and society.



Nature and Health

Nature and human health are deeply interconnected, underpinning resilient economies and societies. As climate impacts intensify, putting ecosystems, biodiversity, water systems, and public health under pressure, protecting and restoring nature is not just mitigation, it's about creating healthier, more resilient communities. The priority is scaling the solutions that deliver measurable benefits for both people and the planet.



Transport and Industry

Transport and heavy industry are at the heart of the global emissions challenge; but they're also part of the solution. From electrification and clean fuels to green construction and circular supply chains, we must reimagine how we move goods and people, build and manufacture at scale. The goal is clear; cut emissions at scale, unlock growth and turn low-carbon innovation into competitive advantage.

Energy security is back at the center of decision-making. Supply is tightening. Geopolitical tension is escalating. But there is hope. In some markets, renewables are meeting all new demand, though this progress remains uneven and far from system wide. At the same time, innovation is creating new flexibility within existing energy systems, unlocking capacity through smarter buildings, demand-side technologies and more efficient use of available energy. Together, these developments are reshaping how energy security can be achieved.

Leaders are now operating across two systems at once, a legacy fossil-based system that still carries the load, and a clean system that is scaling but not yet fully in place. Managing both is becoming harder. If we move too slowly to transition, risk deepens but if we move too fast, systems strain. For business and policymakers, this is now a question of execution: how do we turn clean energy momentum and system innovation into real energy security?

- What will it take to ensure clean power scales fast enough to strengthen energy security and where is this already happening?
- What kind of transformation is required to deliver energy security and decarbonization at speed, and are current strategies anywhere close?
- Where should leaders be willing to take the biggest hit right now; price, pace, political capital, or reliability, to move the transition forward?

In 2023, UN Secretary-General António Guterres declared the era of "global boiling" had arrived. Since then, extreme heat has disrupted businesses, strained infrastructure, and put growing pressure on workers, supply chains, and critical systems. The recent energy shock showed how quickly economies can be disrupted when essential systems come under strain. But the challenge ahead is likely to be broader, more physical and more persistent. Heat is no longer a future climate risk. It is a business reality.

Yet many organizations still treat extreme heat as a short-term operational issue rather than a strategic business challenge. As temperatures rise and heatwaves become more frequent, the gap between physical reality and business preparedness continues to grow.

Autonomous vehicles are among the first forms of physical AI beginning to reach real-world scale, already reshaping how people move through cities.

The world does not have a clean-energy technology problem. We have a scale, speed and price-point problem. India offers a glimpse of what happens when these three start moving together. In little more than a decade, solar in India has gone from an emerging technology to a 168 GW installed industry, a transformation powered by policy, manufacturing, finance, innovation and, above all, relentless scale.

But the real story is bigger than gigawatts. It is the story of a price curve becoming a development curve. As solar became cheaper, markets expanded. As markets expanded, manufacturing scaled. Solar began moving beyond the grid, to farms, homes, businesses and communities. Now comes the next leap: from Surya to Silicon. Can countries build their own manufacturing, skills, finance and project-development ecosystems? Can we compress the decades it took for some technologies to mature into years?

Unlocking Grid Capacity for Electrified Road Transport

Transport electrification is accelerating globally, driven by corporate commitments, industrial policy and growing demand for cleaner transport. As fleets electrify, however, the electricity system is emerging as one of the defining challenges of the transition.
